Bring a hard copy of your Coggins or picture of your Coggins on your phone—internet is not always available on grounds at check-in.

The Foothills Riding Club would like to welcome you to our fifth annual hunter pace. Trails are mainly wooded trails, with some fields and some steep grades. Most trails are wide and open, with some bridge crossings, a short time on a road, and at least one water crossing. All jumps are optional.

Parking will be very limited and we encourage you trailer-carpool when possible. Enter at main gate and PLEASE follow parking attendant volunteers to assist with maximizing our capacity for the day.

PLEASE OBSERVE COURTEOUS TRAIL ETIQUETTE. When passing—please walk when approaching and departing a slower group, and give adequate distance before resuming a faster pace. Communication is KEY! Many people bring young or green horses that can get rattled by the commotion and excitement, and we wish all riders to have pleasant rides, no matter what pace they ride.

- *Schooling Fee: \$40 for FRC Members, \$50 for non-members.
- **Checks payable to FRC.
- ***Groups or individuals interested in schooling the water complex **must** email Jan Bellows at **Janbellows@gmail.com** and reserve a time in advance. Groups of 2 will be combined, no more than six in one group. Each group will have <u>20 minutes</u> to school the water complex. Once you have received a time, please make sure you are on time and prompt. If you are a "no-show" you will be liable for the fee for your reserved time slot.

Entries:

All entries, fees, and release forms will be taken upon arrival at the FENCE Trail Shelter (on right, just inside the main entrance to FENCE at 3381 Hunting Country Road, across from the show grounds).

Rules:

- 1. FRC RELEASE FORM must be signed by rider, or by parent or legal guardian, if rider is a minor, under 18. RELEASE may <u>not</u> be sign by trainer or instructor. Those without proper signature will not be allowed to ride.
- 2. Negative Coggins on participating horse (within one year) is required.
- 3. Rider must be accompanied by an instructor/coach or person responsible for their safety. Instructor may ride without paying the fee if they do not use the jumps or water complex (their horse is their transportation only).
- 4. ASTM/SEI approved helmets MUST be worn with harness secured when mounted. Safety vest required for all those who are jumping. The wearing of medical arm bands is highly recommended.
- 5. USEA safety and cruelty rules apply. Violators will be asked to leave the grounds.

Parking:

Participants can park in the FETA parking field. Overflow parking will be at the Show Grounds.

Water:

Nearest water is at the FENCE Center flagpole or at the Show Barns. Please bring your own equine and people refreshments.

MY FAVORITE HORSE

In January, I led the FRC board's first meeting of 2024. It marked the first meeting I presided over as the president this year. Despite not being particularly prone to nerves, I found myself unusually anxious about addressing this group of 12 ladies, most of whom I know quite well. There was no apparent reason for my nervousness; however, I wanted to foster better discussion among everyone. Over the years, we've all endured those cringe-worthy icebreakers used by leaders attempting to stimulate group interaction with the most random and non-conversation-worthy questions. Thus, I settled on what I believed to be the optimal question to calm my nerves and initiate dialogue among the horse people in the room: "Who is your favorite horse of all time, whether from the past, present, or fiction?" Remarkably, this question resonated with everyone, setting the tone for the meeting and fostering a sense of community.

Each month, we aim to share our favorite horses—past, present, or fictional—with you. We encourage you to submit your favorite horse so we can feature it in our newsletter each month!


My favorite horse of all time is more representative of a breed than a specific horse: the Thoroughbred. Since I was young, I've been captivated by horse racing, enthralled by the excitement of the starting bell and the spectacle of horses thundering down the track towards the finish line. Witnessing the victors prance into the winner's circle, adorned with a blanket of roses, always filled my heart with joy. While I've never attended a race in person, come Kentucky Derby day, you could invariably find me glued to the TV screen. As I became more earnest about riding and aspired to compete myself, I set my sights on acquiring an OTTB one day. When the film "Secretariat" premiered, it became my go-to movie during moments of respite. I knew every line by heart and would become emotional watching Big Red gallop down the track. Even now, when I rewatch the movie and witness him thundering down the home stretch of the Belmont Stakes to the tune of "O Happy Day," tears well up in my eyes (I actually pulled up the video to remind myself of the scene and found myself shedding tears-literally). The movie always instilled in me the belief that things would improve if I worked towards my dreams.

Favorite Horse continued

I would argue that Secretariat is my favorite horse of all time. However, upon bringing home my own OTTB, Private Humor, aka Prim, I had the opportunity to fall in love with my true favorite horse. She wasn't flashy, she didn't have any chrome, she wasn't even that tall, and she was the prissy mare I ever met, and I'm a mare person! But she had heart. She had the will to work, and the gameness to jump anything I pointed her at. Our partnership was a brief yet remarkable competitive career. I bought her sight unseen through a picture on Facebook, without even conducting a PPE. While she was awesome in every aspect, she developed a funky walk one day. Following many months of specialized shoeing by our amazing farriers, bi-monthly chiropractic sessions with our favorite Dr. Grace, countless days of rehab, and many tears shed, I made the decision to retire her as a recipient broodmare. Through this experience, I gained perspective and came to appreciate the journey she led me on. While the past few years presented numerous challenges, they also provided moments of unparalleled joy. I wouldn't have grown as a rider without Prim's presence. Thoroughbreds possess an innate ability to transform. They transition from their racing careers to excel in diverse endeavors, defying the limitations of their past experiences. If racing isn't their forte, they have the opportunity to discover a new way for their real talents to shine.

In life, our past experiences don't dictate our futures. We possess the ability to reinvent ourselves and pursue new endeavors. Much like Penny Tweedy with Secretariat, who refused to allow her initial status as a housewife to hinder her ascent to become one of the most influential horse owners of all time, I've confronted challenges head-on. With Prim, the past few years have tested me. Anyone who has had their horse suffer an unexplainable injury understands the emotional toll it takes on a person. It drained me in more ways than one. Ultimately, I had to retire her and come to terms with what life would look like now for me in the saddle. I have my older mare who's more content to trail ride than to compete and a mini-mule that drives me crazy. As I look ahead to the future, I may or may not get another OTTB or I may explore an entirely new breed to fall in love with. Regardless of what lies ahead, I recognize that time is on my side. There's no rush to realize my aspirations within the next three months. I can find the joy of riding again and dare to dream once more.

So yeah, my favorite horse of all time is a Thoroughbred.

2024 OVERVIEW OF EVENTING RULES

FOR DRESSAGE JUDGES

Below are some, but not all, variations to the USEF Dressage rules that you may encounter while judging Eventing dressage at national Horse Trials. Please refer to *USEF Rulebook* for further details (ELOC update 1/31/24).

EQUIPMENT

Neck Straps made primarily of leather | Permitted. (Subchapter EV-10.2k)

Saddle Pad Logos | Permitted; sponsor logos must be 200 sq. cm or less (FEI Article 541.2)

Spurs | Optional for all levels. Must be smooth metal, max length of shank 4cm from boot to end of spur and pointed toward rear. (Subchapter EV-9.4)

Noseband tightness | Rule wording: "may never be so tight as to harm the horse." (Subchapter EV-10.2b(1))

Dr. Bristol | Permitted (EV Annex A)

Wavy bits (i.e., Happy Mouth with bumps) | Permitted (FEI Eventing Annex A)

French Link snaffle | Permitted. (EV Annex 1)

ATTIRE

Half Chaps | Permitted for all levels; black or brown, full grain smooth leather with matching boots. (Subchapter EV-9.5e)

Jackets | Optional through Preliminary. Required for Intermediate and Advanced unless waived due to extreme heat. (Subchapter EV-9.5a)

Gloves | Only required for Intermediate and Advanced. Optional for Preliminary and below, but must be dark, tan, beige or white. (Subchapter EV-9.5c)

Helmets | Any color, discreet accents permitted, including national flags. (Subchapter EV-9.5a)

Breeches and Jodphurs | White or light colored only for eventing dressage. (Subchapter EV-9.5d)



USEA 2024

EXECUTION OF TEST

Fall of rider

Not eliminated, but penalized by effect on movement, and in collective mark. If horse leaves ring: Eliminated. (EV119.3 and EV 118.9)

Boots or bandages in ring or around outside, whips when not allowed, or discrepancy in dress Two (2) points in "other errors" column, not cumulative. Must stop and correct, may have assistance. (EV119.2a)

Entry before bell, or late entry 45-90 seconds Two (2) points "other errors", not cumulative. (Late entry over 90 seconds = Elimination.) (EV119.2b)

Learning wrong test

After initial error, ask rider to stay in ring and try to ride correct test.

Most riders know both tests of their level. If they have 3 errors, they are scored as a "TE" for Technical Elimination. They are not permitted to leave ring, learn test, and return. (EV118.11 and EV118.9)

FRC Scholarship Application

FRC is proud to be able to award four scholarships annually. In order to qualify for an FRC Scholarship, you must be a current FRC member at the time of your application. Additionally, your request must be for a rare educational opportunity or clinic or a championship competition purpose directly related to your riding discipline. In exchange, scholarship recipients must give back to the club in some tangible way.

Scholarships are for a maximum of \$250; four awarded yearly

- Scholarships for May, June, July events are due April 1st
- Scholarships for August, September, October events are due July 1st
- Scholarships for November, December, January events are due October 1*
- Scholarships for February, March, April events are due January 1st

If there are more than 4 applicants, volunteer service to the club in the current and preceding membership year will be taken into awarding scholarships.

Applicants will be notified of acceptance after review by the FRC Board.


