Have you heard the latest buzz? No, not the cicadas. Our 2024 events calendar has grown again. Get out your pens and save these dates!


The Hunter Pace has been rescheduled for June 8th. Full details will be posted on <u>wchpace.org</u> soon.

FRC Youth Program Mission Statement (what is it about)?



INAGURAL FRC WORKING EQUITATION CLINIC AND SCHOOLING SHOW

With a full clinic of 18 horses and riders, judge Polly Limond guided groups of three through the big picture and the finer points of working equitation ease of handling on Saturday. The day was followed by a course walk for the next day's show and ended with pizza dinner with the judge.

We had a very full slate for Sunday's schooling show, with a wide range of sizes, types, and breeds, as well as a variety of tack and attire. There were two mules, a Saddlebred, Gypsy Vanner or two, Quarter Horses, Thoroughbreds, Arabians and many mixed breeds. Some were ridden western, some dressage, some hunt seat, and some in the vaquero style.

The day started with dressage in the outdoor ring, then moved to the covered for Ease of Handling (EOH) and speed rounds. No matter the breed or style, the purpose was the same – to correctly and efficiently navigate obstacles with calm, clear connection to the horse (or mule). Some riders above Intro level chose to participate in the speed round where many of the nuances of EOH are set aside to reach the goal of completing the course in the fastest time, in the correct order, with minimal faults.

Many people came together to make this new-to-us event such a success. In addition to the usual slate of incredible volunteers, who I can't thank enough, this clinic and show required obstacle construction and transfer and course setting – then taking them all down and back to their original home. Ardent working equitation supporter, Melissa VanDoren, was a generous sponsor of the event and Buck's Pizza in Tryon donated pizza for the Saturday dinner. Region 7 director, Pat Melton, scored all three schooling phases, hosted a refreshment table for the riders, and gave me invaluable information, ideas, and moral support for the last three months.

Three things come to my mind when I think back on the weekend. Great people! Great horses and mules! Great fun! High five everyone!



MY FAVORITE HORSE



1ST FRC 2024 SEMINAR

Keynote Speaker: Mrs. Margaret Freeman (Dressage S-Judge) Topic: How to get 8's on your test.

What a great turnout! From the moment Margaret took the "stage," she had our full attention, giving us an insight into her job as a judge. Any judge's role is to assess how close the horse/rider conform to the ideal criteria of the training scale: Rhythm (Regularity), Suppleness, Contact, Impulsion, Straightness, and Collection, and must be prepared to use scores from 0-10 depending on the performance of each and every movement. And that is for every level and the tests within that level.

What does it mean when we get a 7? Fairly good but could be better. A 6 – should be better, and a 5 – must be better. Margaret's advice before signing up for a show/class is to pay close attention to the directives, which can be found online or in the test booklet. Know what level your horse is at. If you are schooling he/she at 2nd level, sign up for 1st level etc. She also encourages riders to learn the tests by heart and so well one can concentrate on the movement, when to give a half-halt, etc.

If a mishap occurs, don't dwell on it but focus instead on what comes next. She proceeded to give us a valuable pointer as to how to execute a better entry into the ring. Those 45 sec. after the whistle, bell, etc. should be used wisely and as an opportunity to familiarize your mount with the spooky things in the ring, i.e. judge's stand, tent. Then enter the ring in front of the letter A in a shoulder-fore aiming for straightness and an immobile square halt, followed by a prompt move-off. Cutting corners or going too deep can cost you points, and you are missing out on an opportunity to rebalance your horse through half-halts. It truly is the little things that count when you are trying to achieve the magical 70+% score and, therefore, pay attention to the FREE WALK, STRETCHY CIRCLE, CHECK YOUR POSITION, USE THE AREAS THAT AREN'T MARKED (between letters). ON SERPENTINES SHOW THE CORRECT CHANGES OF BEND, PREPARE YOUR HORSE FOR EACH MOVEMENT, AND ACCURACY AND GEOMETRY

I believe that the attendees who plan on entering future shows now have a more clear understanding and are better equipped to enter the show ring more confidently. Judging is not an easy task and comes with a lot of responsibility. We are very grateful to Margaret for having taken time out of her busy schedule to spend the evening with us. She chose to donate her \$100.00 honorarium to the Lendon Gray Dressage4Kids program, which FRC did on her behalf.

FRC Scholarship Application

FRC is proud to be able to award four scholarships annually. In order to qualify for an FRC Scholarship, you must be a current FRC member at the time of your application. Additionally, your request must be for a rare educational opportunity or clinic or a championship competition purpose directly related to your riding discipline. In exchange, scholarship recipients must give back to the club in some tangible way.

Scholarships are for a maximum of \$250; four awarded yearly

- Scholarships for May, June, July events are due April 1st
- Scholarships for August, September, October events are due July 1st
- Scholarships for November, December, January events are due October 1st
- Scholarships for February, March, April events are due January 1st

If there are more than 4 applicants, volunteer service to the club in the current and preceding membership year will be taken into awarding scholarships.

Applicants will be notified of acceptance after review by the FRC Board.






